towed by the launch, and drew it closer to step into it. Mrs. Turner ventured into the smaller boat with him. When she stepped into

with him. When she stepped into with him. When she stepped into the boat, the waves created by the propeller of the launch caused the smaller boat to dip and capsize throwing both of the occupants into the waters of Mt. Landing Creek. Every member of the party except the captain, who was in his cabin operating the launch, saw the boat when it capsized. Knowing that Clarence was a good swimmer, they sensed no immediate danger. Both persons sank and returned to the surface. Clarence yelled "help! Help!" and the cry "man overboard" brought the launch to a standstill several yards from where the victims were last seen. It is reported that Mrs. Turner in her efforts to prevent drowning grabbed Mr. Harris across his chest and arms in such a manner that he could not save himself nor her, and they disappeared in thirty feet of water. Their bodies were located by draggers the next afternoon. Crabs had badly distigured the faces of both victims, but the bodies were so well restored to life-likeness by the mortician that they were viewed by hundreds of friends at his parlors.
