

Know all men by these presents, that
we William Crump by Maria Crump his attorney in
fact and Charles S. Imhearts are held and firmly bound
unto Fabius M. Dawson, treasurer of the com=
monwealth of Virginia, in the just and full
sum of eleven hundred and fifty dollars and
sixty three cents, to be paid to the said Fabius
M. Dawson, treasurer as aforesaid, and his suc=
cessors in office; To which payment well and
truly to be made, we bind ourselves, our heirs, ex=
ecutors and administrators, jointly and severally,
firmly by these presents.

have hereunto set our hands and seals, this
twentieth day of May, one thousand eight hundred
and forty six

The condition of the above obligation is such,
that whereas, by an act of the General Assembly
of Virginia, passed the 25th day of February,
1826, entitled "an act concerning the securities
of German Baker, the sureties of German Baker
on his official bonds given as Treasurer of the
Commonwealth for the years 1825 and 1827,
have by the first section of said act, been released
and forever discharged from their liability to the
Commonwealth, in any form, for all the interest
moneys included in the two judgments rendered
against them, by the General Court, in pursuance
of

of a decree of the Court of Appeals on the two above-mentioned bonds. And whereas the second section of the same act provides "that it shall be lawful for the Treasurer to suspend the issuing of executions on said judgments, for the principal sums thereof, till the first day of June next, and in the mean time to receive from each or any one of said sureties, his executor, &c either one fourteenth part in money, of said respective principal sums included in said judgments, with lawful interest on that part from the passage of this act till payment and of the costs; or a bond payable to the Treasurer, in such penalty, and with sureties, as he shall deem fully sufficient, conditioned for the payment of such fourteenth part of the principal and interest as last aforesaid and costs, in two equal annual instalments, from the passage of this act."

And whereas the above-bound William Crump, by Maria Crump, his attorney in fact, one of the said sureties of German Baker, late Treasurer as aforesaid, desiring to avail himself of the provisions of the second section of said act, doth hereby execute and tender this, his bond for the one fourteenth part of the principal sums included in said judgments and costs.

Now therefore if the above-bound William Crump by Maria Crump, his attorney in fact, shall on or before the 25th day of February, 1847, pay to the Treasurer

of the Commonwealth, the sum of two hundred and eighty seven dollars and sixty three cents, and the like sum of two hundred and eighty seven dollars and sixty three cents on the 25th day of February, 1848, (these two sums making together the one fourteenth part of the above-mentioned judgments and costs) with lawful interest thereon from the 25th day of February, 1846, till paid, then this obligation to be void, otherwise to remain in full force and virtue.

The condition of the above obligation is such that whereas, by an act of the General Assembly of Virginia, passed the 25th day of February, 1846, entitled "An act concerning the securities of Jerman Baker," the sureties of Jerman Baker on his official bonds given as treasurer of the commonwealth for the years 1825 and 1827 have, by the first section of said act, been realized and forever discharged from their liability to the commonwealth, in any form, for all the interest moneys included in the two judgements rendered against them, by the General Court, in pursuance of a decree of the Court of Appeals on the two above mentioned bonds. And whereas the second action of the same act provides "that if shall be lawful for the Treasurer to suspend the issuing of executions on said judgements," for the principal sums thereof "till the first day of June next, and in the meantime to receive from each or anyone of said sureties, his executor, etc. either one fourteenth part in money, of said respective principal sums included in such judgments, with lawful interest on that part from the passage of the act till payment and of the costs; or a bond payable to their Treasurer, in such penalty, and with sureties, as he shall deem fully sufficient, conditioned for the payment of such fourteenth part of the principal and interest as last aforesaid and costs, in two equal annual instalments, from the passage of this act."

And whereas the above bound William Crump, by Maria Crump, his attorney, in fact, one of the said sureties of Jerman Baker, late Treasurer as aforesaid, desiring to avail himself of the provisions of the second section of said act, doth hereby execute and tender this, his bond, for the one fourteenth part of the principal sums included in said judgments and costs.
